SCHOOL OFFICE - you main point of contace

- ❖ The School office is open from 8.00am to 4.30pm.
- ❖ If your child is going to be absent from school, please notify the office by telephone or email as early as possible. If the absence is to be longer than 2 days, please confirm in writing.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

- ❖ All children will need a PE bag and book bag. These will be available from the School Office.



SCHOOL DINNERS - 1

Schools meals are cooked daily on the premises by Vertas staff our appointed Catering Contractors, following healthy eating guidelines. A menu is provided periodically showing choices for the main course and dessert. Water is provided and the Little Lions are supervised when choosing lunch.

Your child might be able to get free school meals if you get any of the following:

- Income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get).



SCHOOL DINNERS – 3

- Children get paid these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, and get free school meals
- Registering for free meals could raise an extra £1,320 for the school, to fund valuable support like extra tuition, additional teaching staff or after school activities. This additional money is available from central government for every child whose parent is receiving one of the welfare benefits listed. It is therefore important to sign up for free school meals, even if your child is in Reception, Year 1 or Year 2, so that St Mark's receives as much funding as possible.
- If your child is eligible for free school meals, they'll remain eligible until they finish the phase of schooling (primary or secondary) they're in on 31 March 2023, even if your financial circumstances change.



NUT ALLERGIES

We have a number of children and adults in school who have a fairly severe allergy to a range of nuts and may require medical intervention in the case of an allergic reaction.

In order to assist in the care of these children, please do not include nuts, or nut containing products, such as peanut butter or cereal bars, as part of your child's packed lunch.

At school we talk to the children about the importance of not sharing or swapping their food at lunchtimes but it would help us to reinforce this message if you could talk to your child about this at home too – and explain the underlying reasons why we need to discourage the children from sharing food.

We would also ask that you **do not send in cakes, biscuits etc**. for your child's birthday as these may contain allergens. If you wish to send in a treat for your child's class, sweets such as Haribo or Dairy milk chocolate buttons would be a suitable alternative.

OUR SCHOOL RULES

RELATIONSHIPS AND BEHAVIOUR

St. Mark's operates a reward scheme for good behaviour and achievement and restorative approach to restore positive relationships.

- All pupils are praised readily as appropriate.
- Each child has a rainbow Star Chart. When this is completed, they can choose a prize from the Treasure Box.
- Telephone calls are sometimes made to parents where exceptional effort or progress is evident.
- Badges and medals for excellent attendance are regularly awarded.
- Postcards are sent home on occasions



Home school agreement

As a parent / guardian you are required to:

- support the mission statement and the school's vision
- ensure that your child arrives punctually at school with the appropriate uniform and equipment, including PE kit
- ensure that your child has the best possible attendance and refrain from withdrawing them from school during term time
- notify the school of absence by 8.45 a.m. and confirm in writing if the absence is prolonged
- attend regular school meetings and help with homework where appropriate, especially phonics, reading and mathematics
- ensure that hair is within the natural spectrum of hair colour, and hair style is traditional and smart, avoiding extreme or high-fashion styles
- ensure that shoes are plain black school-style shoes (with black laces if tieup style) without decoration, trim or logos. Trainer-style shoes and boots are not allowed
- be polite, courteous and respectful to everyone in the school community.



Attendance

- ❖ We have achieved excellent attendance rates at St. Mark's and this enables us to provide a high standard of education for all our children. The percentage attendance for the school is currently 97.7%.
- ❖ Holidays in term time will not be authorised, and a Fixed penalty notice fines will be issued by the local authority. We expect your support in this. From September 2022 repeated lateness is also considered absence.

Online Conduct

- •This school asks its whole community to adhere to the 3 Commons approach to online behaviour:
- Common courtesy
- Common decency
- Common sense



How do we show common courtesy online?

- •We always ask someone's permission before uploading photographs, videos or any other information about them online.
- •We do not write or upload 'off-hand', hurtful, rude or derogatory comments and materials. To do so is disrespectful and may upset, distress, bully or harass.
- •How do we show common decency online?
- •We do not post comments that could be considered to be **intimidating**, **racist**, **sexist**, **homophobic or defamatory**. **This is cyber-bullying** and may also be deemed harassment or libel.
- •When such comments exist online, we do not forward such emails, tweets, videos, etc. By creating or forwarding such materials we are liable under the law.
- •How do we show common sense online?
- •We think before we click.
- •We think before we upload comments, photographs and videos.
- •We think before we download or forward any materials.
- •We think carefully about what information we share with others online, we check where it is saved and are aware of our privacy settings.
- •We make sure we understand changes in use of any web site's we use.
- •We ignore and/or block harassing communications and report any abuse, withholding such examples as evidence.

Any actions online which may affect the school, the school's reputation or a member of the school's reputation are deemed inappropriate and will be responded to.

THE SCHOOL DAY

- Wrap around care: from 8am
- ❖The teaching day commences at 8.45am but children can go into the classrooms from 8.30am, when the gate opens.
- Duty staff will be in the playground from this time.
- ❖ Reception children can be accompanied to their classroom until half term when parents are asked to say goodbye at the gate.
- ❖ Morning break is fifteen minutes long. Lunchtime runs from 12.00pm until 1.00pm. Reception and KS1 have an additional 10 minute break in the afternoon.
- Children are given a healthy snack in the morning.



THE SCHOOL DAY - 2

- Lunch break, taken in the main hall, is from 12-1pm.
- ❖ At lunchtime, children are organised into family groups of mixed ages.
- ❖ The teaching day ends at 3.15pm. and Early Years pupils should be collected from their classroom.
- ❖After school care: until 5pm

Every Child A Reader and A Writer

The teaching of phonics in the Early Years is vital in learning to read and write.

You will be invited to attend a workshop in the first half-term and children are expected to practise their skills at home.

We aim for every child to be a reader and writer by the end of Reception as the early years are crucial.

Oracy and Language plays a vital part in extending your child's vocabulary so we screen all children in reception for speech and language to identify any underlying difficulties.



CURRICULUM ORGANISATION ASSESSMENT

- Teachers plan weekly often drawing on the previous week's learning and achievements
- ❖We encourage parents to take an active role in their child's learning (helping out, bringing in items to support weekly plans)
- We observe the children regularly in order to inform future planning taking into account their individual interests
